Fortified Towns of the Netherlands: Historic Importance, Modern Intrigue

Just southeast of Amsterdam, <u>Naarden</u> stands out as arguably the best-preserved fortified town in the Netherlands and all of Europe. Although the strategic garrison town was first built in the 14th century, its characteristic star-shaped defenses were not built until the 17th century.



Naarden is just one of a smattering of former garrison towns and defense infrastructure that comprise the <u>Dutch Water Defense Lines</u>. These lines, built between 1815 and 1940, stretch 200 kilometers southeast of Amsterdam. The Dutch utilized their intimate knowledge of waterways and water management for defense purposes.

lie within these off-the-beaten-path walled towns. While Naarden and others are important historical landmarks, they're also contemporary hubs of culture, cuisine, and modern attractions. From cozy cafes that line the narrow streets to Medieval reenactments, there's definitely something to discover for all!
